

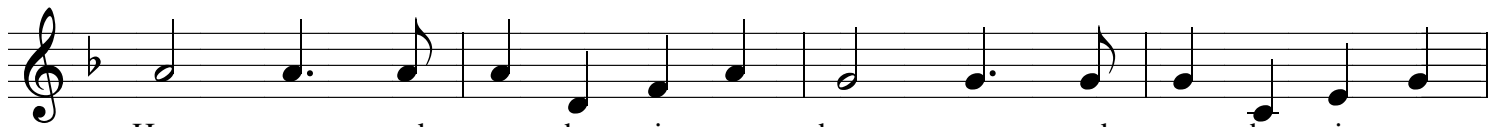

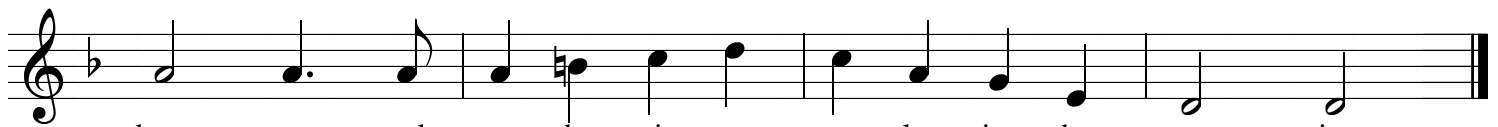
What shall we do with a drunk-en sail - or what shall we do with a drun-ken sai - lor
